#### **Importance & Scope:**

The Critical Care Medicine Department renders services to all patients admitted to Intensive Care Unit, Pediatric Intensive Care Unit and High Dependency Unit from Emergency Department, Operating Room, Wards and transfers from other hospitals. It provides care to a wide variety of patients including medical, surgical and trauma and fulfills the expectation of each patient. The multidisciplinary team consists of experienced and dedicated support staff that specializes in critical care medicine. It delivers critical care services with joint rounds by physicians, nurses, respiratory therapists, pharmacists and others. Critical Care Medicine Department consists of 20 ICU beds, 6 PICU beds, 6 HDU beds and 8 CCU beds. #### Why Dubai, UAE?

The main objectives at this time included sharing expertise and supporting each other. However, there were many difficulties at that time in establishing a formal group. With the help and support of the Federal Department of Nursing (FDON) and the commitment of all members, the Nursing Professional Practice Group – Critical Care was finally established in 1997 by Administrative Decree 27/97. A policy was issued from the Department of Nursing defining their purpose, criteria for forming a group, terms of reference, and the role of the Department of Nursing.






Figure 2: Statistical Analysis




Figure 3: Statistical Analysis

## **Market Growth:**

The critical care market has witnessed slow magnification since 2010, though one sector in particular remote patient monitoring is witnessing paramount magnification. Research and Markets presages an increment of only 2.8 percent per year in the ecumenical market until 2017, according to an incipient report, though magnification was reported at 5 percent annually between 2002 and 2010. In the report, "Critical Care Market to 2017," the research firm estimates that the overall critical care market was worth about \$1-13 billion in 2018. Dubai Health Authority (DHA) said, it will impose a cap of 4.22 per cent on price increases for healthcare services in the emirate in 2015. The authority said the price regulation model is based on the annual rate of inflation published by the Dubai Statistics Centre. From 2013 to 2019, the global market for mechanical ventilators is likely to register a CAGR of 6.6%. The market was worth US\$2,715.7 million in 2014 and is therefore estimated to reach an overall value of US\$4,248.7 million in 2019.Transparency Market Research has released a research report titled Mechanical Ventilators Market - Global Industry Analysis, Size, Share, Growth, Trends and Forecast, 2013 - 2019.




Figure 4: Statistical Analysis

#### **Glance at Market of Advertising and Marketing:**

During 2009 – 2014, just before the global financial crisis, Dubai's population was growing by a CAGR of 13.3% – compared to the period following the crisis (2010 – 2013), where the CAGR stood at 5.1%. . Dubai is one of the major contributors to the UAE's GDP. In 2013, GDP increased by 4.8%. Health care expenditures were estimated to be \$3.09 trillion in 2014, and are projected to soar to \$3.57 trillion in 2017. According to the NAIC during 2013 totaled \$570.6 billion (up from \$546.7 billion the previous year, and only \$411.1 billion) Health spending in the U.S., at about 18% of Gross Domestic Product (GDP) in 2014, is projected to grow steadily. The United Arab Emirates (U.A.E) remains one of the most peaceful and economically stable regions of the world. As one of the largest exporters of gas and oil, the economy of UAE has experienced more than 114 fold increase at a tremendous growth rate over the last 40 years. The healthcare sector is among the 14 major areas attracting large forms of investment, forming part of the UAE Investment Map.

The UAE Healthcare Industry is made up of key autonomous players such as the Ministry of Health, Dubai Health Authority, Abu Dhabi Health Authority, among others. Data recorded from key regulatory bodies and other health establishments revealed a total of 86 hospitals, 2,665 clinics and health centers, 12,752 physicians, 2,916 dentists and 9,592 bed spaces; data pertaining to health indicators, 2010. These are further classified into government and private portions of health facilities and resources over the years 2007 to 2010. UAE is a fast growing country which is heavily reliant on foreign health care professionals who come from different countries. In fact, a reported 82% of health workers in UAE are expatriates whereas nationals only comprise around 18% of all health workers.

The annual healthcare budget in 2004 was U.S. \$470 million up from U.S. \$313 million in 1995 (Younies et al., 2007). These investments have allowed the UAE to make major progress in the health care sector thus greatly influencing the ranking of the UAE as 43rd out of 174 industrial and developing countries in the latest UN Human Development Report (UAE Government-Health). Approximately 82% of health workers in UAE are expatriates whereas nationals only comprise around 18% of all health workers (Younies et al., 2007).

Most health workers (69.7%) in the UAE are employed in the public sector while health workers in the private sector make up 30.3% of the whole workforce. National health workers are employed solely within the public sector whereas expatriates are employed in both the public and private sector (69.2% and 37.1% respectively).




Figure 5: People
